They take particular delight in layering the glazes they apply. Kirstin Farr and Di Peach were in charge of the firing process. Turn up the heat and wait for the magic to happen. It is fascinating to see the red hot pots being lifted from the kiln and cooled in water or combustibles. A final scrub, and the visitor can then walk away with their masterpiece. This year was a sellout – all pots gone to new homes.

The downstairs hall at the Hub was full of activity.

the staff and students of Lilley-Lee Gallery and Art School. Trevor Downes is as old as the HDG itself, and he was set to sketch anyone who felt the need for immortality. Sitters were welcome to take their portraits with them. Well done and thank you Trevor, Cindi, and Derek.

Papermakers and Artists of Queensland were in a bit of a mess, but that was all under control as well. Joanna and Kris dipped small screens into their gluggy stew of pulverised paper. The screens came out clogged with this gunk, but Joanna and Kris were not dismayed. They were excited – or if they weren't - the gunk was returned to where it came from, and another slosh and dip occurred. Papermaking, and the products this group creates are eternally interesting and variable.

Julie Shepherd is a member of Ceramic Arts Queensland but is also renowned Australia wide for her sought after delicate pierced porcelain pieces. She was demonstrating and explaining her technique at the Brisbane Visual Arts Community Open Weekend – for free. You just had to sit, watch, and listen – and yes, she answered questions.

Anna-Margot is the doyenne of Enamelling in Queensland. A trained silversmith, Anna-Margot leads the Queensland Enamellers Guild and throughout the day was demonstrating enamelling techniques and answering questions.

Just outside the backdoor. Western Suburbs Clayworkers invited visitors to take a seat and Play with Clay. The take up was impressive. The group provided examples and the individual interpretations of these were very creative. David kept an eye on anyone wanting to have a "go" at real pottery - i.e. on the wheel. Even the very well dressed were prepared to don an apron and try. There were many WSC volunteers on hand over the weekend to demonstrate techniques and then lead the beginners on their journey. WSC supplied a pottery wheel and clay for the activity.

Upstairs, The Watercolour Society of Queensland provided an interesting, hands-on activity that allowed visitors to experience the joy of playing with paints without putting too much pressure on their visitor's creativity. The group had prepared simple outline



drawings for the activity and demonstrated basic techniques before letting the visitors loose. Those who took up the challenge learned that Watercolour was not all about hard caked blocks of colour activated with water. Very impressive.

The Bookbinders' Guild ran one of the most intriguing workshops – "secret Belgian book binding". Just shows how inquisitive human beings are – this was one of the first paid workshops to sell out. Just put secret in there and we want to know what the secret is. The result was a colourful, yet unobtrusive little notebook that had the fabulous property of opening flat – no matter what the page. How is that possible? Unfortunately, we'll now just have to wait until next year or watch for Bookbinder's workshops.

Sunshine Beaders, Scattered Arts, and ATASDA presented very professional stands featuring fabulous examples of the work produced by their groups.

Australian Porcelain Art Teachers are always at a bit of a disadvantage when it comes to hands on activities simply because the process of painting on porcelain is very dependent on multiple firings, slow cooling, and building up of painted surfaces. APAT had helpful volunteers on hand for continuous demonstrations of the painting technique.

Most of the above activities were free of charge, but the Open Weekend also allowed members the opportunity to conduct specialised workshops for a fee. CAQ offered their Raku Experience, which is always popular because of the drama involved, but other workshops offered included Gill Scott's "Polymer Clay Buttons"; making a Tallie Kumihimo necklace with Helen Medland; and Anna-Margot and Allie Collins were teaching how to make an Enamel Pendant or Enamel Earrings. Julie-Ann Barker was teaching how to create engaging Backgrounds using Acrylic paint, while Susan Hoy taught Slow Stitching (Rabbit or bird). Sarah Davies and Kerrie White had fun with Paste Paper for Bookbinding, and Joanna Fear and Allie Collins gave away the secret of Secret Belgian Book Binding.

Brisbane Visual Arts Community Hub Mural by Perrin Millard (Director Lilley-Lee Art School)



Over the past two months, the Lilly-Lee staff and students have had the pleasure of working on the Brisbane Visual Arts Community (BVAC) door mural. It has been a lovely experience for our younger students to be involved in, providing a sense of community and purpose that is often lacking for this younger generation.

As a part of the process, we incorporated important lessons with the students about the differences between graffiti and murals, the importance that public art comes with permission and the benefits that public art can bring to the community. We talked about site specificity, embodying the essence of the space where the public art would inhabit.

The site-specific design by Tanya Ashworth hosts a Blue Wren that sits on gum tree

branches adorned with gum nuts and flowers, singing the BVAC name. Supporting this natural scene is a backdrop of the vertical Brisbane contrasted skyline, against the Queensland sun, filled with sunset colours that are a familiar sight within our landscape. This stylised 3D imagery combines the nature of the forest reserve that surrounds our community space, and the city in which it resides. This integration reflects the sanctuary of the creative space that BVAC provides for its members and to the broader suburban community. The acronym of BVAC is distinctive with its full title, for greater brand recognition. The artwork is bright, lively, and familiar, offering a more creative and inviting presence to the building.

Throughout the process, it has been exciting to see the joy and enthusiasm expressed by the Lilly-Lee community and other BVAC members as they have watched the artwork slowly emerging. We hope the finished outcome brings enjoyment to all.

Brisbane Open House Weekend - "The Shed" by Judy Hamilton

Brisbane Open House (BOH) is a free annual event providing residents and visitors with a rare opportunity to discover the hidden wealth of architecture, engineering and history in buildings and places around Brisbane city.

Selected buildings are open to the public with guided and self-guided tours and activities encouraging visitors to explore, re-examine and engage with Brisbane's built environment. The experience opens people's eyes and minds to good design and curious spaces.

The inaugural Brisbane Open House was launched in 2010 with great success, attracting more than 12,500 visits. Each year, the event has continued to grow and in 2019, our tenth anniversary, BOH attracted 80,000 visits from over 35 participants across 119 sites.

The building that once housed the Queensland Art Gallery and Museum in Gregory Terrace participates in this annual event and was open to the public on July 13, 2024. Known these days simply as the Old Museum Building, the crowds flocked to visit.

The main building is now the home of the Queensland Youth Orchestra, but Sculptors Queensland (SQ) occupies the heritage listed "Shed" within its grounds. The opportunity to showcase the group and talk to people about sculpture was not lost on members who turned up to show visitors their home space.

To make sure that people didn't miss "The Shed" experience on the rather chilly day, President of SQ, Graham Marshall, set up a live "life" sculpture demonstration with Helena Mendes (WSC & SQ) as his chilled model just outside the main Old Museum building. Graham directed visitors to the Shed where they were treated to a sausage sizzle (fund raiser), more sculpture demonstrations, and a small display of member's work.



Open Home at "The Shed"

"The Shed" is SQ's studio and meeting place, and has been a place of art activity for a long time. In the 1950s it was the animal specimen preparation area for displays. Artists like the late Val Waring (HDG) and Rhyll Hinwood (SQ Patron) worked there preparing displays.

It became "home" to Sculptors Queensland in the 2000s. The whales of the "Whale Mall" outside the current Queensland Museum are the work of current SQ member, Jan Williams. They were created in an adjacent building.

On the Open Day visitors were able to see the process of creating a sculpture from life as well as from reference pictures. They were able to talk to sculptors about the work on show as well. The number of visitors to the Shed on the day, and the time they spent talking to the sculptors, would suggest that meaningful connections were made and more people were made aware that such a humble building as The Shed is a valuable asset to Brisbane's artistic community.
